SUSTAINABILITY - ENERGY EFFICIENCY IN ACTION

Who left the light on? Every home seems to have two types of people - one who turns on every light “for ambience,” and one who follows behind switching them off to save money (and the planet!)

So, how much does it actually cost to leave a lamp on? Year 5/6 students have been finding out through hands-on investigations into energy use. Using thermal cameras, light meters, moisture meters and power meters, they’ve been exploring how energy is used in homes and workplaces and where it’s escaping. The learning won’t stop at school. Students will be taking equipment home, testing appliances and sparking conversations with their families about energy costs, appliance efficiency and insulation. It’s been fantastic to see students leading the way — questioning everyday habits, understanding real costs and encouraging smarter, more energy-efficient choices beyond the classroom.



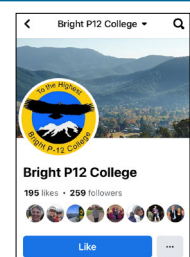
Yr 12 PRODUCT DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY

Yr 12 BIOLOGY

As part of Unit 3&4 Biology, students used gel electrophoresis to separate different chemical molecules found in food dyes based on their molecular weight and charge. This technique is also used to separate and analyse DNA. They learnt how to operate micropipettes to load the gel and their pipetting techniques certainly improved with practice.



Yr 2/3 MATHS

What do you get when you mix capacity and a large tub full of water? A fun, engaging and wet Maths session! Year 2-4 students have been exploring measurement and, during the capacity section, we took the classroom outdoors to get hands-on. Students experimented with different containers, estimating and measuring how much each could hold using both formal and informal units of measurement.



Yr 8 MUSIC

This term, Year 8 students are exploring a range of musical elements and learnt how to use them to analyse music.

They also had the opportunity to explore a variety of instruments to discover the instruments they are most interested in. Composition was embedded throughout their learning, with students using crotchets, quavers and semiquavers to compose their own rhythmic patterns.



CAREERS - EXCURSIONS

At Bright P-12 College, we pride ourselves on providing opportunities beyond the classroom for students to explore different pathways. Over the past few weeks, senior Secondary students have participated in two opportunities to learn about pathways in the health field and those available for creative types.

Eleven Year 10 and 11 students visited Wodonga TAFE to immerse themselves in an environment that encouraged innovation, artistic expression and collaboration. Students participated in hands-on activities to learn about pathways in music, interior design, photography, art and graphic design. See photos below.

Nine Year 10 students were part of the North-East Victoria Health Careers Forum in Wangaratta. Students chose from a selection of workshops, including (but not limited to) paramedicine, midwifery, nutrition, nursing and pharmacy, and learnt about studying and working in the health field.

In early June, a group of students will join the Victorian Trade and Tech Fit Expo in Melbourne, designed specifically for female students to showcase high priority trade and STEM industries typically targeted to males.



Yr 7&8 O&M AFL

On Wednesday 13th May, our Year 7 & 8 boys and girls travelled to Martin Park in Wodonga to compete in the Ovens & Murray Junior AFL event.



Bright P-12 College students combined into one team to play in the Year 8 comp, giving us quite a challenge as half of our team were from Year 7.

The team put in a great effort in all 3 of their games, coming home with 1 win.

Yr 4 SCIENCE

Year 2-4 students have been working on their unit, 'What's the Matter?' exploring a range of materials to investigate their properties, noticing how changes can be reversible or irreversible, and learning how materials are used for specific purposes. As they explore, they test theories, discover new ideas, and ask more questions while having fun.

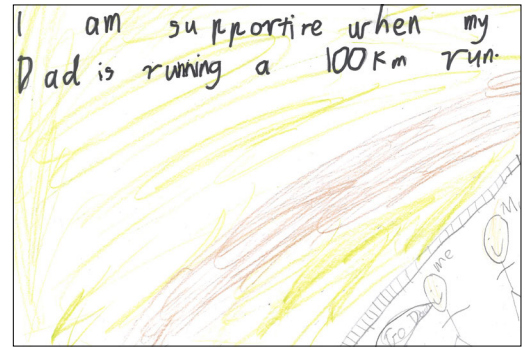
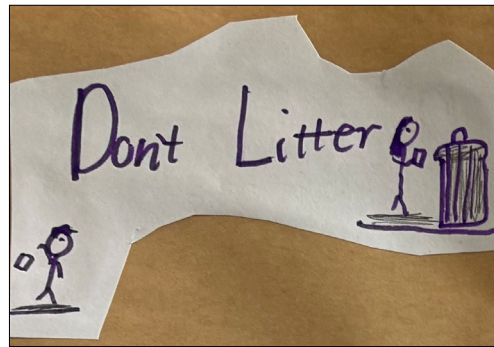
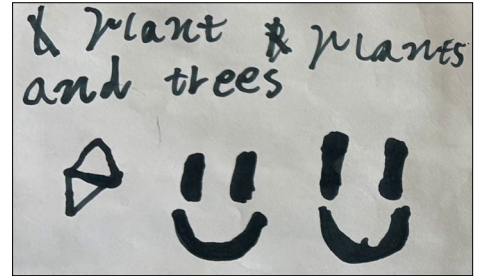
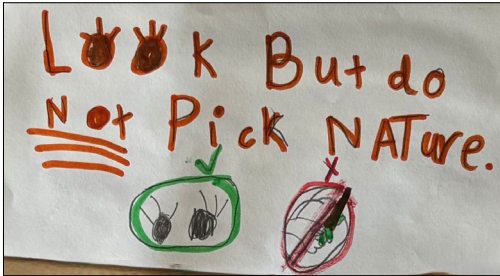


PRIMARY WELLBEING

Topic 2 – Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships (RRRR): Summary

Topic 2 of the RRRR program focuses on recognising and celebrating personal and cultural strengths. Across Prep to Year 6, students explore their own identities, including their abilities, interests and backgrounds, while also learning to value diversity in others. The topic supports students to develop a sense of belonging, respect for different cultures, and confidence in who they are. Through these experiences, students build positive relationships and strengthen their understanding of inclusion and respect. Here are some student reflections from Topic 2:

- The battle between Tommy F & River S. 1 win each so far this year. We can't wait to see the outcome of the next event!

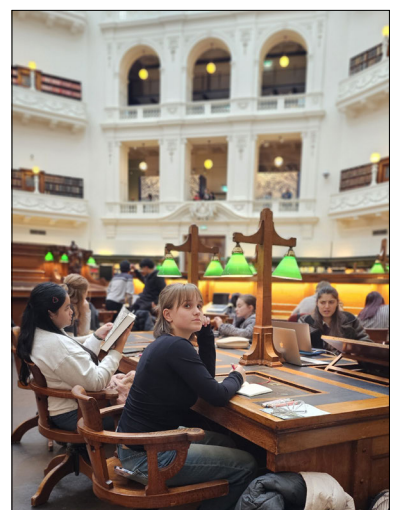


MELBOURNE WRITERS FESTIVAL CAMP

The Melbourne Writers Festival camp is a 2 day camp for students interested in reading, writing and immersing in art and culture in the city. Students who attended the 2026 camp all applied with written applications to express how this camp would improve their writing and reading.

Students travelled to Melbourne and attended the NGV to create fantastic beasts in their workshop. The next day, students attended the Melbourne Writers Festival and listened to authors talk about their writing process and how they built their worlds. We also visited the State Library and wrote in The Dome. It was wonderful to see how much students immersed themselves in the process and we think we have some books currently being written!

Yr 10 SCIENCE

Year 10 students have moved into a unit on Genetics and Inheritance. Throughout this unit we look at cell structure and the building blocks of life, that is DNA, and how this is packaged in chromosomes. Students successfully extracted DNA from strawberries and kiwis and looked at this under a microscope. Students will further explore concepts such as Karyotyping, mono hybrid crosses and pedigrees, and why we appear to inherit certain traits from our parents (or don't). This unit involves a lot of problem solving and always provokes a lot of questions as well as sparking curiosity.



WELLBEING - LOOKING AFTER YOURSELF

School, friendships, exams, homework, sport and social media can sometimes feel like a lot. When we feel stressed, worried, frustrated, tired or overwhelmed, we can start to neglect the basics of looking after ourselves. Self-care is about looking after your wellbeing. It doesn't have to mean buying expensive things or spending hours "relaxing." Often, self-care is about meeting your basic needs so that you can be physically and mentally healthy. Some simple ways to look after yourself include:

- Getting enough sleep
- Having a regular routine
- Eating regularly
- Drinking enough water
- Moving your body through sport, walking, dancing, stretching or play
- Taking breaks from screens and spending time in nature
- Making time for hobbies or connecting with people

Coping strategies are tools we can use when our emotions start to feel overwhelming. Here are some examples of coping strategies you might like to try:

- Taking slow breaths
- Noticing 5 things you can see
- Breaking a big task into smaller steps
- Listening to music, journaling, drawing, or going for a walk
- Reminding yourself: "I don't have to figure everything out right now."
- Reaching out for support when you need it

At school, students can access support wellbeing support by contacting a trusted teacher or a Year Level Coordinator for a wellbeing referral. Parents and Carers can also reach out if they would like support for their child or young person. Here at school, we have several lunchtime clubs and activities for connecting with peers and exploring new hobbies.

Secondary lunchtime activities and spaces:

- Community Club – Thurs, Rm 10
- Create Club – Fri, Rm 10 (sign up required)
- Board games/quiet reading – Tues & Fri, Library
- Art Room

Primary lunchtime activities and spaces:

- Board games – Mon, Library; Mindful colouring – Wed, Library
- Art Club – Second half lunch Tues & Fri (Yr 3-6), Art Room
- Lego Club – Fri, Prep room
- Basketball – Thurs, Stadium (1st half lunch Yr 3-4, 2nd half Yr 5-6)
- Stadium - Tues 1st half of lunch (Yr P-2)

Not every coping strategy works for every person. It's about figuring out what helps you. Remember: asking for help is a skill, not a weakness. Everyone needs support sometimes. Supportive people and healthy coping strategies can make a big difference over time.

PRIMARY SRC BIODIVERSITY AUDIT

Our Primary SRC students have been busy getting their hands dirty (and their eyes wide open!) as part of a recent Biodiversity Audit in the College garden. With the guidance of Darren and Renee, students explored the garden to discover just how many different plants and animals call it home. What they found was impressive!

What did we discover? The audit revealed a rich and thriving environment. Students identified:

- A wide variety of indigenous ground covers, trees and shrubs that flower in different seasons to ensure a constant supply of nectar
- An abundance of fascinating invertebrates, including the paradoxical keeled millipede and the striped greenhouse slug - ick!
- The homes of native paper wasps and wolf spiders which play an important role in keeping the garden healthy by preying on pesky green caterpillars

Students were excited to see how much life exists beneath leaves, in the soil, and among the plants we pass every day.

Why it matters. This project helped students understand that our school garden is more than just a place to grow plants – it is a living ecosystem. Every plant, animal and insect plays a role in supporting biodiversity and maintaining balance in the environment. Learning about beneficial insects like paper wasps also helped students see that not all bugs are pests—many are actually helpers in keeping our garden thriving.

What's next? The Primary SRC will now use their findings to think about how we can:

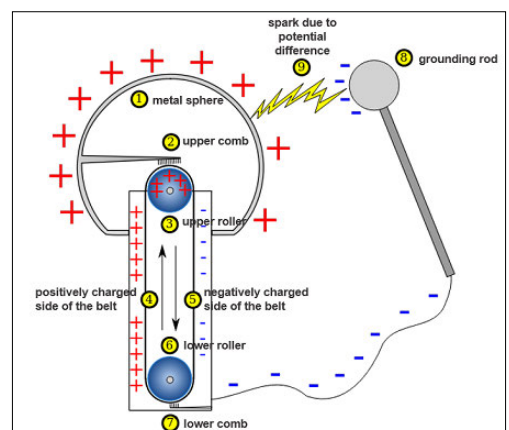
- Continue to support native plants and animals
